



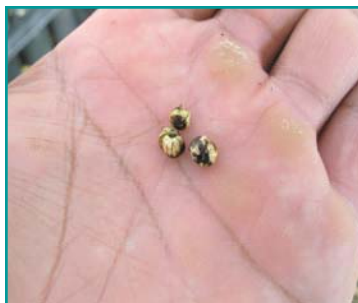

Description

Hunik is a small-medium sized tree (up to 25ft) that grows naturally along the beach strand (Raulerson & Rhinehart, 1991). It is native to Mariana Islands and other Pacific islands (Stone, 1970). Its attractive white flowers grow in panicles, and its fruits mature from green to yellow, eventually turning brown. Hunik trees are easily recognized by their silvery-hairy leaves (Stone, 1970).



Propagation

Hunik fruits contain a couple of seeds and germinate within several weeks to 3 months. The species can also be propagated by cuttings and air-layering.

Uses

Hunik wood is not durable, but has been used for shoe lasts on Guam (Safford, 1905). Its leaves are used for wiping goggles to prevent fogging. Other islands use hunik for medicinal purposes. F&SRD will outplant these species on beach parks and other urban areas near the sea.
